

# Double Weight Letter From the Small Village Office at Giadinh – 2 x 25c to Philippeville, Algeria






# Cangiou, Cochinchine to Innsbruck, Austria



#### Registered Printed Matter

- Posted from the small village at Travinh in 1904
- Posted to Tampico, Mexico
- Rate of 35c = 2 x 5c
   (printed matter rate) +
   25c (registration
- Excellent origin and destination








#### Small Village of Lam, Tonkin

- Quadruple weight (4 x 25c) registered letter (25c) at 1F25c rate
- From the small village of Lam in 1905
- To Dresden
- Use of the 50c brown on bluish issue of 1900









### Use of 15c Group Type from Paris



#### Tourane, Annam - 1903

- French Community rate letter franked at 15c
- Franked with 5c yellowgreen Group Type stamp and 10c cutout from the Group Type post card
- Cutout X'd out
- Charged 10c due on arrival in Paris – why not 20c which is double the deficiency?

## What is the Law Governing These Covers?

- Specifically, I do not know
- But it appears that if you made an effort to prepay the postage on an item with a legitimate French Community stamp or postal stationery cutout, the addressee did not have to pay double the postage, as on a typical due letter, but only the actual postage

#### Langson, Tonkin - 1905

- Franchise militaire letter from Langson in 1905
- Franked with two 15c
   franchise militaire stamps
- Struck with **T** in triangle for postage due
- Charged 30c due on arrival in France
- Why?



#### Possible Explanations

- Letter reached the third weight level (30-45g)
- Charged 30c due on arrival which is double the deficiency of 15c

- Letter reached the second weight level (15-30g)
- Only one F.M. stamp was allowed per letter
- Additional weight levels had to be prepaid with regular stamps
- Second F.M. stamp invalid
- Second weight level charged as postage due – double the regular 15c postage





#### Bassac, Laos 1896

- Mailed from Bassac in February 1896
- Manuscript endorsement:
   Mission du Laos
   suggesting that this was a military franchise letter (free postage)
- T in triangle applied in Bassac for postage due
- Charged 50c due on arrival in France
- Why?





#### Christoph Gaertner May 2012

- Posted THADO LAOS 18 OCT 1907 to Hanoi
- Printed matter Indochina envelope uprated to 10c
   French Community rate
- Various transits on reverse
- Only recorded example from this office
- Depart: 3000 euros;
   Realized: 4800 euros







#### The Dealer Bertrand Sinais

- Paris dealer has 3 sales each year with about 10,000 lots in each sale
  - Each lot gets a two line description very little information on which to bid
  - Only about 400 lots are pictured
- There are always a large number of lots that arrived late for the sale and are crammed into the last 5 or so pages in the sale

#### The Tale of a Late Lot

- It is a registered military concession rate (15c postage + 25c registration) franked with Group Type stamps pre - 1899
- Processed through the office of Saigon with the octagonal military cancel: CORR D'ARMEES SAIGON
- The manuscript endorsement reads: *Troupes du Siam*
- The manuscript validation reads: Le médecin chef de l'ambulance Chantaboun
- The blue military cachet clearly shows: SIAM



This was a late lot with a two line description, and no mention of Chantaboun or SIAM in the description



#### The Tale of the Late Lot

- This lot was in the late hour section of the catalog in the 9000's
- There was NO picture of it
- I never saw it
- The starting price was about \$150. It sold for about \$1200 the price one would pay for a military concession letter from a small village such as Scotrang, Bentré, Vinlong, etc. at this time
- I subsequently heard from the dealer David Wrigley that the only known military concession rate from Chantaboun, Siam was buried in the back of the Sinais catalog and sold for \$1200.
- About six months later it was offered to me for a modest \$13,000 with a color xerox (previous slide) for enticement.
- The price of \$13,000 was about 3X what I thought it to be worth.
- I have never seen nor heard anything of it since.
